This cypress tree behind me was personally planted by Fr. Barrett some years ago. It has now grown into a fine tall tree. I still remember when we first moved from Robinson Road to Wan Chai, we were so proud of our new spacious and beautiful

campus. However, after over fifty years of usage, this place has become much rundown. To our good fortune, subsidies from the Education Department's School Improvement Programme have come in timely. By adding funds raised under the School Development Project (SDP) banner, we have managed to build this new annex that we call Phases I & II. We have torn down a small part of the school premises, namely the old music room with the father's chapel above it, and built a new annex over it, utilizing part of the upper car park.

We aim at providing future Wahyanites with proper facilities and a better environment in which to study and grow. This is why we are also planning Phase III of the SDP. It will rebuild the school hall and turn it into a spacious one that will accommodate all the students at a single assembly. Five extra classrooms and a few other multi-purpose rooms on top of the hall will also provide more space in which students may learn. Fr. Deignan and I had hoped to complete this important task earlier. Unfortunately, we have encountered problems related to the weak economy in Hong Kong and around the World in recent years.

In my opinion, now that the economic situation has improved, alumni and friends of Wah Yan should consider strengthening their support for the SDP and donate more generously.



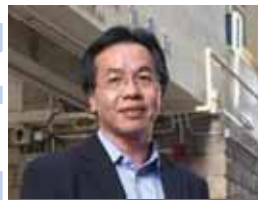

Despite of its height, the new extension building blends into the campus well. Wah Yan's campus, in many ways, is unique. Take the chapel as an example, its design is one of a kind in the world. It uses red bricks and is decorated with mosaic tiles inside.

The design of the teaching block is also very unique. The designer used coloured pillars that, in fact, are drainage pipes, to decorate the building. To handle the hot weather, the designer chose to use wooden louvers that allowed the free flow of air for better ventilation. In addition, Wah Yan is also the place where our Chief Executive attends Mass every week. With fifty years of history behind it, I personally feel that the whole campus

should be preserved as a heritage building.

In my opinion, the new SDP building is blending in well with the older parts of the campus, improving usable space without sacrificing heritage.

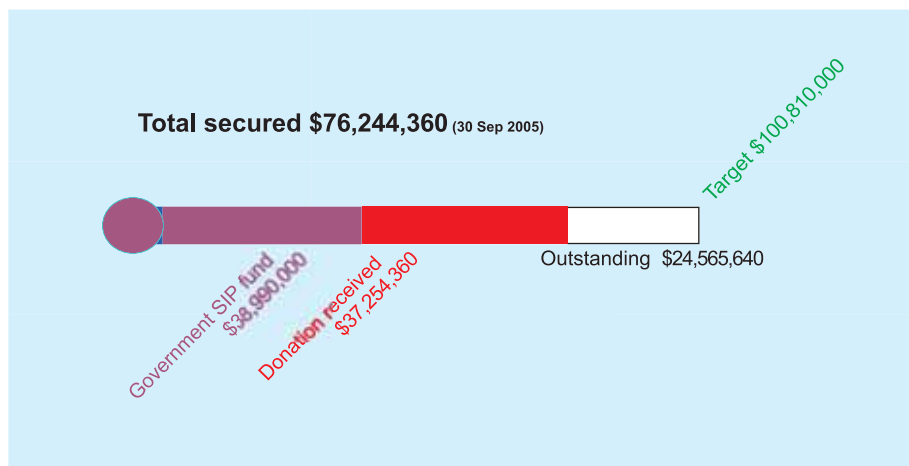
